

He refined the images of M45 by adding 19 flat field frames to improve the visibility of the dust cloud that is in front of the open star cluster. The cloud itself is not related to the cluster but is in the interstellar medium.

# Awards and Honours - Gruber Prize in Cosmology

On October 1<sup>st</sup>, retired DAO astronomer and former Director Dr. Sidney van den Bergh was one of four international scientists awarded the 2014 Gruber Prize in Cosmology, for their pioneering work in what is now called Near Field Cosmology. Only the Nobel Prize is considered more prestigious. Dr. van den Bergh is one of the world's most prolific researchers, having published over 500 refereed publications and more than 260 other contributions (including 2 books) which have jointly been cited nearly 19,000 times! Unfortunately Sidney - at age 85 - was unable to attend the ceremony. His son Peter accepted the award on his behalf and told a delightful story about how Sidney became interested at the tender age of five. Prof. Sadanori Okamura summarizes the contributions of all four individuals; interestingly, he was one of a number of young Japanese astronomers Sidney brought to Victoria shortly after becoming DAO Director in late 1977, because he foresaw tremendous opportunities between the newest generation of Japanese and Canadian astronomers. This has borne tremendous fruit. Four decades later Canadians are actively involved with Japanese astronomers in ALMA, have developed RAVEN (an innovative adaptive optics system) for SUBARU, and are seeking funding in the next federal budget to become a full partner in the TMT.
